What we've accomplished so far

2024 was another successful year for the Primary Schools Music Festival (PSMF)! Our repertoire selection committee selected a vibrant and age-appropriate repertoire, ensuring a lifelong experience for all. The talented PSMF Team crafted a visually stunning performance, bringing joy and inspiration to everyone involved. The presence of the Governor General added a prestigious touch, culminating the concert series in a truly memorable way.

We love all the creative ways you include as many kids as possible in every aspect of the concerts.

Program impacts: Covid and the restrictions/implications associated; year 7 transition to high school; skills shortage.

Future challenges: How do we promote the PSMF to schools? To inform schools that the program exists and that even if a school does not have a choir teacher / musical person, we can find an HPI for them.

Feedback from several teachers indicates that scheduling choir during lunchtime or at the end of a Friday afternoon is becoming problematic. Additionally, the cost of participating in choir has exceeded \$100 per child. While in other schools students are only paying for the Student Leaning Materials.

Moving forward: It is crucial to maintain the high quality of the PSMF program, ensuring equitable access and inclusion. The need for continuous data collection (qualitative and quantitative) to assess the effectiveness of the program and guide future improvements.

How do we collaborate with schools to inform and encourage them about the significance of our program, ensuring that fees remain minimal and do not include costs that the schools have agreed to cover upon affiliation, such as TRT costs?

Student Participation





Challenges for the program: Covid and the restrictions associated; year 7 transition to high school (pool of students was years 5-7 prior to the transition and now it is only years 5 and 6); schools scheduling choir during break time; staff shortages (including PSMF team) and the volunteer pool is shrinking.

2024 gave students extra performance / participation opportunities: 225 students for Auslan signing; 39 students (consisting of 35 boys) as Rhythmic Rumblers.

School visits by PSMF





Our directors & managers spend many hours on the road, providing affiliated schools the opportunity to get to know both staff and students; to model choir teaching techniques; to assess choirs; to hold workshops; conduct Combined Choir Rehearsals, run auditions, and rehearsals plus so much more.

- Regional visits and assessments 22 (these are held on weekends)
- Combined Choir Rehearsals (CCR) a 90-minute rehearsal for neighbouring schools - 63
- Choir assessments (metro) this provides information on stage placement of choirs for the Adelaide concert series -146
- Various locations 445 vocal soloists auditioned (66 required)
- Various locations 31 choreography leaders auditioned (22 required)
- Various locations 126 Guest Artist auditioned (44 required)
- Various locations Orchestra, Troupe, Rhythmic Rumblers, and Host auditions.

Staffing and Governance

The PSMF has a close relationship with Dr. Anita Collins of Bigger Better Brains. Anita is internationally recognized for her unique work in translating the scientific research of neuroscientists and psychologists to the everyday parent, teacher and student. We invited her to write an introduction to the 2025 Songbook explaining why singing in a choir is important to students' learning.

Educator, researcher and writer in brain development and music learning.



Singing is wonderful for your brain and body! It activates various parts of your brain, improving your cognitive functions—that means it helps with things like memory and attention. Singing releases endorphins, which are chemicals in your brain that make you feel happy and reduce stress. It's also great for your emotional intelligence, helping you understand and manage your feelings better. Moreover, singing can enhance your reading comprehension by helping you better understand the flow and expression of language, which is essential when you're reading and interpreting text.

In music and choir rehearsals, you're doing more than just practicing songs; these are special times where you grow and learn a lot. While you're often focusing on getting the notes right and making your singing better, there's more going on than you might notice. When you hit a wrong note, it's not just a simple mistakeit's actually a chance for your brain to learn something new. These moments help you and your friends understand each other better and work together as a team. Understanding these situations shows how singing together can really help everyone become stronger, both as individuals and as a group.

Physically, singing is a workout for your lungs and helps develop stronger respiratory muscles, which means you can breathe easier and deeper. It even boosts your immune system by increasing antibodies; these are like tiny defenders in your body that fight off germs. So, singing isn't just fun, it makes you happier and helps you perform better at school!

Financial Performance

Ticket and merchandise sales

Tickets have remained at \$48.00 since 2021. This price point seems to work with our audiences, not too expensive. Financially this may not be viable for 2025.

Merchandise items include concert programs, mascots, shoelaces, pencils, backpacks, etc. Sales are showing to be a good source of income for both Adelaide and the Regionals. In 2024 the merchandise income was almost \$40,000. Southern Metro made just under \$2,500 profit for their festival. The Riverland will be taking this offer up in 2025.

Fundraising and Sponsorship

2024 marks the beginning of income through fundraising and sponsorship:

- \$8,700 was raised in sponsorship to advertise in the concert program, on our socials and website
- \$1,690 was raised through the Australian Cultural Fund and Ticketek (tax deductible)
- \$2,000 from the Jane Lyall Scholarship was received and distributed to Berri PS, Riverdale PS and Kangaroo Island Community Education (KICE)
- \$500 from the Suzanne Scholarship, established to improve regional and remote access to and participation in Orchestra. This year an Orchestra family received \$500 in a fuel voucher to ensure the student attended rehearsals and workshops.

Maximizing Donations

Funders, sponsors and private donors are valuable to our program and will make it possible for the PSMF to grow, to keep costs at minimum for students and families, and to provide exciting learning opportunities for students in public schools in South Australia into the future.

I believe a Development and Marketing Officer would play a crucial role by focusing on growth and outreach. A specialist is essential for:

- Brand Awareness: increasing visibility and awareness
- Strategic Planning: aligning marketing strategies with our goals

- Fundraising and Revenue Generation: pursuing funding and revenue opportunities
- Community Engagement: building and maintaining relationships with stakeholders
- Market Research: conducting research to understand needs
- Communication: managing consistent messaging across all platforms
- Innovation and Development: identifying new opportunities

Overall, I believe a Marketing and Development Officer is essential for driving growth, enhancing reputation, and ensuring the PSMF success in a competitive environment.

2025 Plans

As I write this report, the planning for the 2025 Songbook and concert series at the Adelaide Entertainment Centre are well underway.

- The repertoire selection committee, when choosing songs for 2025, were very conscious of the venue and chose songs accordingly
- Nextstage has been working on the set design, first drafts have been seen. The set will look very different from our 2021 design

Looking beyond 2025 the future for the PSMF is bright, I am filled with optimism for what lies ahead, from new initiatives to the continued growth.
